A Bill In Support Of the Berkeley Political Review (BPR)

Sponsored by Senator Meghana Dhar**

- WHEREAS,** the Berkeley Political Review is UC Berkeley's only nonpartisan political magazine and is run entirely by students; and
- WHEREAS,** it is managed, published, and distributed entirely by students and has a staff of approximately 30; and
- WHEREAS,** the magazine is published four (4) times a year; and
- WHEREAS,** BPR is an eighth (8th) year student publication (PUB) that requested \$6,607.70 and was allocated \$2,400 in the ASUC Spring Budget for the 2008-2009 year; and
- WHEREAS,** it is trying to expand its presence on campus through a better website, more engaged recruitment, and campus events, such as a debate between the Berkeley College Republicans and the Cal Dems; and
- WHEREAS,** this is an election year, and the Berkeley Political Review plans to publish longer, more in-depth editions in the fall that are printed in color, as opposed to the otherwise black-and-white magazine, as well as increase the magazine's circulation; and
- WHEREAS,** BPR's primary source of funding comes from the ASUC, ad revenue, and concession sales, and they plan to run a deficit of approximately \$2,220 to \$2,720 this year. Their primary costs come from printing. The following is the proposed budget for the Berkeley Political Review for the 2008-2009 school year:

A Bill in Support of Students for Sensible Drug Policy

WHEREAS, because the War on Drugs has historically been justified as necessary to protect youth, it is our responsibility as young people to stop this harmful war from being waged in our names any longer; and

WHEREAS, over three fourths of Americans believe the War on Drugs is a failure

WHEREAS, Students for Sensible Drug Policy (SSDP) will give their members an opportunity to learn and fight back the ill effects of the War on Drugs by moving it away from as a criminal justice issue to a public health issue; and

WHEREAS, SSDP will also oppose the provisions of the Higher Education Act that have denied financial aid to over 200,000 students that were convicted of drug possession; and

WHEREAS, drug possession and underage drinking account for the largest percentage of crime among the UC Berkeley student body;

WHEREAS, SSDP mobilizes and empowers young individuals to participate in the political processes, pushing for sensible policies to get a safer future while fighting against policies that directly harm students;

WHEREAS, The budget for SSDP is as follows;

Banner: \$130

Flyers: \$45

Food (for first meeting): \$25

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the ASUC recognizes Students for Sensible Drug Policy (SSDP) as a first-year Student Activity Group (SAG); and

BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED, that the ASUC Senate allocate \$200 (two hundred dollars) to Student for Sensible Drug Policy (SSDP) from the ASUC Contingency Fund.

A Bill in Support of ICF-EEF Concurrent Nominations in the By-Laws

Authored by AAVP C. De La Cruz and Senator T. Tran

Sponsored by AAVP C. De La Cruz and Senator T. Tran

WHEREAS, the ASUC Senate aids in administering the disbursement of the Intellectual Community Fund (ICF) and the Educational Enhancement Fund (EEF) by appointing two senators to the two Committees; and

WHEREAS, historically, the ASUC Senate has appointed the same Senate members as representatives to the aforementioned committees and has found it to improve effectiveness and efficiency; and

WHEREAS, the Committee for EEF meets only twice a year to consider grants to assist DE-Cal courses which falls under the purview of the Committee for ICF, being that they both facilitate and support campus-related endeavors;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Executive Vice President will concomitantly solicit the nomination of two Senate members to serve on the Committee for Intellectual Community Fund and Committee for Educational Enhancement; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that Title 15, Article 2, Section 2, Subsection 2 of the ASUC By-Laws shall be amended to read:

Within the first two weeks of the Academic Semester, the Executive Vice President shall solicit the nominations of two Senate members to serve as representatives to both the Committee for Intellectual Community Fund and the Committee for Educational Enhancement, subject to two-thirds approval of the Senate.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that Title 19, Article 2, Section 2, Subsection 2 of the ASUC By-Laws shall be amended to read:

Within the first two weeks of the Academic Semester, the Executive Vice President shall solicit the nominations of two Senate members to serve as representatives to both the Committee for Educational Enhancement and the Committee for Intellectual Community Fund, subject to two-thirds approval of the Senate.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, in the event that either grant is considerably modified, either in its allocation, administration, or requirements, this by-law shall be re-assessed for validity; and

BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED, while this amendment suggests the Senate members appointed be the same, the ASUC Senate, the office of the Academic Affairs Vice President, and the ASUC still consider each grant independent and fundamentally different.

A Bill in Support of Berkeley Engineers and Mentors (BEAM)

WHEREAS, Berkeley's Undergraduate and Graduate students are academically talented and have immense potential to mentor the youth; and

WHEREAS, BEAM's founding philosophy is to ensure students of disadvantaged socio-economic backgrounds a longitudinal program with engaging engineering activities that stimulate their interest in pursuing careers in science, math, and engineering. UC Berkeley students will volunteer their time mentoring younger students, learning about science education, and building relationships with their mentees; and

WHEREAS, BEAM is a student-initiated, philanthropic joint-venture, and unification of several engineering projects-based mentorship programs sponsored by seven different ASUC sponsored SIGs and SAGs; and

WHEREAS, BEAM operates in tandem with university-based programs and departments such as CalTeach, Center for Underrepresented Engineering Students, Pre-Engineering Partnerships, Dept of Bioengineering, Dept of Chemical Engineering, and Dept of Mechanical Engineering; and

WHEREAS, BEAM intends to serve the following sites for the Fall 2008 semester:

- A. George Washington Elementary (Berkeley, CA)
- B. Berkeley-Oakland YWCA TechGYRLS (Oakland, CA)
- C. Fort Mason Home Away from Homelessness (San Francisco, CA)
- D. Richmond High School (Richmond, CA)

WHEREAS, the mentorship activities cover a wide array of academic fields requiring strong financial backing; and

WHEREAS, BEAM is seeking ASUC sponsorship to utilize the Tax ID code that the Auxiliary allows entities to use when receiving donations and monetary sponsorships from corporations, charitable foundations, academic institutions, etc. BEAM also seeks ASUC sponsorship as it will benefit immensely from the Non-Profit Status the ASUC bestows upon its groups; and

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the ASUC recognizes BEAM as a 1st year Student-Initiated Service Group (SIG) for the above purposes. No funding is required as of this moment.

A Bill in Support of Hispanic Engineers and Scientists' (HES) YES Day

WHEREAS, Hispanic Engineers and Scientists (HES) is a student organization of approximately 70 members dedicated to the advancement of Latinos in science and engineering; and
WHEREAS, HES is an integral part of recruitment and retention efforts at the University of California, Berkeley's College of Engineering, earning high recognition from the College of Engineering's Center for Underrepresented Engineering Students (CUES) and receiving the Society of Hispanic Engineers (SHPE) National Blue-Chip Award (highest recognition); and
WHEREAS, HES is a vital link between its members and industry as it assists a sizeable amount of students annually in regards to post-undergraduate careers; and
WHEREAS, HES serves current undergraduates through retention programs such as Winter Academic Training (WAT) Camp while inspiring grade school students through programs such as Young Engineers and Scientists (YES) Day and Ositos (Little Bear) Tutoring; all of which leads to a \$40,000/year budget; and
WHEREAS, YES Day is an annual event serving over 80 children from local Bay Area elementary/middle schools with a purpose of engaging the students in engineering, encouraging pursuit for college, and educating families of the students; it is to be held on October 11, 2008; and
WHEREAS, starting this year YES Day will be a collaborative event involving a bevy of groups from the Latino and Engineering communities at UC Berkeley; it is imperative for the ASUC to support collaborative endeavors among such a large sector of its sponsored groups; and
WHEREAS, the projected budget for YES Day as of August 31, 2008 is:

A Bill in Support of Cal Hep B Free Fall 2008 Pilot-Program

Authored by Denis Lam, Grace Shen, Senator S. Yang, and Senator T. Tran
Sponsored by President R. Winston, Senator S. Chen, Senator S. Cho, Senator M. Dhar, Senator E. Nahabet, Senator T. Raffi, Senator C. Rodriguez, Senator W. Smelko, Senator T. Tran, Senator S. Yang, and Senator Y. Zuo

WHEREAS, the ASUC unanimously passed SB 97 of Fall 2007 to recognize the National Hepatitis B Act and support all student organizations/efforts committed to the promotion of hepatitis B (HBV) awareness, screening, and vaccination; and

WHEREAS, the ASUC, the ASUC Auxiliary, and Team HBV have cooperated in a Fall 2008 semester-long, philanthropic joint venture entitled “Cal Hep B Free” to address the often-overlooked, chronic hepatitis B carriers who are at risk to themselves and to their contacts at the University of California, Berkeley; and

WHEREAS, “Cal Hep B Free” is a student-initiated program with the following objectives:

- 1.) B SMART: Dispel misconceptions and create campus awareness about the health risks of HBV and the importance of screening for HBV, especially among the following high-risk ethnic communities at UC Berkeley: Asian and Pacific Islanders and individuals from the Middle East, Eastern Europe, Russia, Sub-Saharan Africa, Amazon Basin, and indigenous regions of the Arctic;
- 2.) B TESTED: Promote routine HBV screenings and assist and direct students, faculty, and staff to the Tang Center and other local sites where they may obtain free or low-cost screenings;
- 3.) B FREE: Design and implement a unique, coalition-partnership model that involves campus and local Community Partners to maximize long-term impact and sustainability; and

WHEREAS, Cal Hep B Free Community Partners are defined as an entity or organization committed to uphold the following responsibilities in good faith:

- 1.) Endorse Cal Hep B Free’s mission and objectives.
- 2.) Assist with publicity of Cal Hep B Free’s activities and events;
- 3.) Urge its members and/or constituents to attend Cal Hep B Free events;
- 4.) Urge its members and/or constituents to get screened for HBV; and

WHEREAS, the Steering Group, Advisory Board, and Community Partners of Cal Hep B Free will implement the following strategies to create campus awareness and promote HBV screenings:

- 1.) CAMPUS VISIBILITY by launching a campus media outreach campaign in collaboration with the Office of Business Outreach and Marketing, Transit Advertising Program, the Daily Californian, and Community Partners;

- 2.) ONLINE VISIBILITY by constructing a dynamic website CALHEPBFFREE.ORG and use of popular online social networking and communications utilities;
- 3.) HEP B AWARENESS WEEK launched during the week of September 15-19 with events and activities that address the objectives of Cal Hep B Free;
- 4.) FIVE-DOLLAR REVERSE CO-PAYS given to the first 1,000 students that get screened at the Tang Center which permits NON-SHIP students to obtain discounted screenings and SHIP-insured students to obtain free screenings;
- 5.) B SMART, B TESTED, B FREE \$1,000 CHALLENGE launched to offer a \$200 reward to the student and \$800 reward to the Campus Life and Leadership registered student group that recruits the most people to get screened; and

WHEREAS, the Steering Committee, Advisory Board, and Community Partners of Cal Hep B Free will carry out the following events:

- a.) September 15, 2008: Press Conference with campus and local media outlets;
- b.) September 16, 2008: Rock the Jade Hepatitis B Awareness Concert and Address by Assemblywoman Fiona Ma;
- c.) September 17, 2008: Hepatitis B Teach-In with doctors and medical specialists to address students about HBV; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the ASUC supports the Cal Hep B Free Fall 2008 pilot-program and its collaboration with many off and on-campus Community Partners for the promotion of hepatitis B awareness, screening, and vaccination; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the ASUC Senate allocate \$1500 (one thousand five hundred USD) from the Senate Contingency Fund to the Cal Hep B Free Fall 2008 pilot-program; and
