**WHEREAS**, Project Pueblo will work with a multitude of groups and people, spanning from NGOs, businesses, government agencies, churches, schools/student groups, and individuals; and

**WHEREAS**, the first branch exists in Berkeley, and the rest are in the process of expanding to UCLA, USF, and La Sierra; and

**WHEREAS**, upcoming trips include:

- a) **Research Trip - May 25-31** (Main group: Project Pueblo Leadership)  
Pueblo Project members will spend time networking and gathering information throughout the Navajo Nation, and will seek help with cultural, governmental, economic, and educational informational gathering and networking.
- b) **Trip to Rio Puerco Youth Center II - June 1-7**  
Pueblo Project members will be putting up walls in the dilapidated building which members previously worked on. Aside from renovating the building, members will be tutoring children at the nearby schools and spending time at an orphanage.
- c) **Trip to Rio Puerco Youth Center III - June 15** (Main group: Project Pueblo @ UCLA)

**WHEREAS**, students interested in East Asian languages and cultures have established the East Asian Languages & Cultures Undergraduate Student Association (EALCUSA) as a vehicle for articulating concerns, for facilitating a broad, multidimensional undergraduate education in East Asian languages and cultures, for encouraging faculty-student contact, and for advancing the interests of students in East Asian languages and cultures classes; and

**WHEREAS**, EALCUSA recognizes that the creation of this organization is long overdue, though in the past, given the small scope and size of the Department of East Asian Languages & Cultures and the number of students enrolled in classes and major/minor programs, the existence of an undergraduate student association was impractical and unnecessary; and

**WHEREAS**, given the recent demographic change and growth in the students enrolled in classes and major/minor programs in the Department of East Asian Languages & Cultures, it is now viable and necessary to form an undergraduate student association; and

**WHEREAS**, in light of last year's egregious and unfair budget cuts to the EALC department, students realized that there was no structure in place for them to communicate with peers and colleagues in the department; and this was evident when students were not consulted, involved in, or informed of any departmental decisions due to lack of cohesion and cooperation among students in the department; and

**WHEREAS**, students should be involved in the decision-making processes of the department and should have a space to voice their ideas, concerns, and needs pertaining to their supposed first-class education; and

**WHEREAS**, the needs of students enrolled in classes and major/minor programs in this department are changing rapidly, and the curriculum should reflect those broadening academic, education, and professional needs; and

**WHEREAS**, students should also have a say in the creation and revision of that curriculum; and

**WHEREAS**, EALCUSA plans to create and maintain a network of alumni who will be invited back to give presentations about career options for students who graduate with degrees from the department; and

**WHEREAS**, understanding that many students from our department travel abroad to study, EALCUSA plans to hold study abroad informational meetings that will introduce the various study abroad programs available, the application procedure, the pros and cons of studying abroad, scholarships, programs that are not affiliated with UC Berkeley, and more; and

**WHEREAS**, realizing that there is a sharp divide between faculty/lecturers and undergraduate students, EALCUSA will hold a faculty-student dinner where students will have the chance to communicate with faculty and get to know them better, in hopes of forging constructive relationships that will encourage

students to pursue writing honors theses, undergraduate research, applying for graduate school, and more; and

**WHEREAS**, because the East Asian Languages and Cultures Department is a foreign language department and the cultivation of foreign languages is essential to students' education, EALCUSA will organize language exchange events where students can practice their language skills with native speakers; and

**WHEREAS**, EALCUSA will inform students the processes involved and the classes needed to major/minor in Chinese/Japanese/Korean, as well as what other students in the past have done (in terms of double/triple majoring or minoring), in hopes of attracting more students to EALC programs; and

**WHEREAS**, in recognition of the divide among students of different languages and language class levels, and realizing that students are hard-pressed to find upper-classmen to consult with on careers, future classes, etc., EALCUSA will hold telebears peer advising events where upperclassmen will be available to answer lower classmen's questions regarding the classes/professors in EALC; and

**WHEREAS**, the operational items are as follows:

**A Bill In Support of the ASUC Psychological and Psychiatric Disability Scholarship**

**WHEREAS**, UC Berkeley is recognized as a public institution providing opportunities for underprivileged students facing difficulties affording their education; and

**WHEREAS**, UC Berkeley is on the forefront for promoting disability rights, both for the physically disabled and those with registered mental illnesses; and

**WHEREAS**, this past year, approximately 300 students with a psychological or psychiatric disability were registered with UC Berkeley's Disabled Students Program; and

**WHEREAS**, in a publication primarily authored by Professor Mary Collins of Boston University's School of Social Work, 86% of students with a registered psychiatric disability dropped out of Universities across the United States of America; and

**WHEREAS**, in that same publication, an estimated only 15-20% of individuals with psychiatric disabilities have higher-paying skilled level positions requiring undergraduate or vocational-school education; and

**WHEREAS**, UC Berkeley can not only aid one student through the scholarship but also set a precedent for college campuses across the country to create such a scholarship for students with the aforementioned disabilities; and

**WHEREAS**, fundraisers for the scholarship have already been conducted and will continue to be conducted to both raise awareness and to strengthen the financial pool for the scholarship; and

**WHEREAS**, the Disabled Student's Union will fund all administrative and application costs for the scholarship and the Disabled Student's Program will be directly involved in selecting a student for the scholarship in order to maintain confidentiality; and

**WHEREAS**, the budget is as follows:

**ASUC BY-LAWS**

**Title XXIV**

**ASUC Psychological and Psychiatric Disability Scholarship**

**ARTICLE I - NAME AND PURPOSE**

**1.1 Name and Purpose**

The ASUC Psychological and Psychiatric Disability Scholarship seeks to provide students with a registered psychological or psychiatric disability with a scholarship for one year. In addition, the scholarship will help build awareness for students with such mental illnesses across the country, with the hopes that similar appropriations of funding will be given towards these students on other campuses by other Universities.

**1.2 Administration**

The Disabled Students' Program shall administer the ASUC Psychological and Psychiatric Disability Scholarship. The Disabled Students' Program shall coordinate with the University Office of Financial Aid and the University Office of the Registrar to advertise the program to the largest number of eligible students possible.

**1.3 Number of Scholarships**

The ASUC shall award at least two (2) scholarships per year. At least one male and one female student will be awarded a scholarship each year.

**1.4 Amount of Scholarships**

Each ASUC Psychiatric and Psychological Disability Scholarship shall be for the amount of \$750.00.

**ARTICLE II - ELIGIBILITY**

**2.1 Eligibility for New Scholarships**

Any UC Berkeley or UC Berkeley Extension Student shall be eligible to receive an ASUC Psychiatric and Psychological Disability Scholarship, provided that the student meets the following requirements:

1. The student is registered with the Disabled Students' Program of UC Berkeley for having a psychiatric or psychological disability..

2. The student is a registered UC Berkeley Student in good standing;
3. The student maintains a UC Grade Point Average of 2.5 or above;
4. The student uses the Scholarship funds only to pay for UC Berkeley tuition or fees, housing costs, or textbooks or other course materials purchased at the ASUC Store.

## **2.2 Verification of Eligibility**

The Disabled Students' Program shall arrange for verification of the eligibility requirements. For use of funds, the Disabled Students' Program may arrange for the direct payment to the University of tuition or fees, for vouchers redeemable at the ASUC Student Store, or for the reimbursement of approved receipts, as defined in 2.1.4.

## **2.3 Future Contribution**

Recipients of ASUC Psychiatric and Psychological Disability Scholarship shall have the moral obligation to contribute to the ASUC Psychiatric and Psychological Disability Scholarship program after graduation once they find themselves in the financial position to be of assistance to the program.

## **2.4 Additional Eligibility Requirements**

Students may only receive this scholarship once during their education at UC Berkeley.

# **ARTICLE III - CRITERIA FOR AWARDS**

## **3.1 General Criteria**

ASUC Psychiatric and Psychological Disability Scholarship shall be awarded to eligible students (as stated in Article 2.1) based upon the following criteria:

1. Academic Achievement (25%)
2. Community service, leadership, and personal history, which can include financial need (75%)

## **3.2 Calculations of Academic Achievement**

An applicant's Academic Achievement shall be based on their GPA. The academic achievement criteria shall also consider letters of recommendation pertaining to academic achievement, any classes and results from outside academic course work, such as community college or high school work.

## **3.3 Calculation of Financial Need**

An applicant's Financial Need shall be based on the Financial Need determined for that student by the University Office of Financial Aid, that results from the filing of a Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) or other forms required by the Financial Aid Office.

## **3.4 Calculation of Community Service and Leadership and Personal History**

The Applicant's community service and leadership shall be based on an assessment of the applicant's resume, information supplied on the application, and a Personal Statement. Letters of Recommendation from supervisors of various activities shall also be considered.

# **ARTICLE IV - APPLICATION**

#### **4.1 Form of Application**

The application for the ASUC Psychiatric and Psychological Disability Scholarship shall be developed by the student-run Disabled Students' Union in conjunction with two (2) selected ASUC senators and be reviewed by the Disabled Students' Program. The Disabled Students' Union must seek to create an application that allows a student to clearly illustrate an applicant's overcoming of impediments due to his or her psychiatric or psychological disability. The Disabled Student' Union shall submit the application to the Disabled Students' Program for review. The Disabled Students' Program shall allow applications to be printed off the Disabled Students' Program website ([dsp.Berkeley.edu](http://dsp.Berkeley.edu)) and subsequently collected at the Disabled Students' Program (260 Chavez Student Center, Berkeley CA, 94720). Paper applications shall also be available at the Disabled Students' Program. If the Disabled Students' Union is unfit to create the application, all application duties will be bestowed upon the Disabled Students' Program. The Application shall include;

1. A Personal Statement or Essay. The Disabled Students' Union and/or the Disabled Students' Program may determine a subject to be addressed or may leave the statement to the Applicant's discretion. The Disabled Students' Union and/or the Disabled Students' Program shall determine the length of the statement.
2. A statement authorizing the release of academic and financial information from the applicant's University of California Application for admission, for the sole use of the Evaluation Committee, as is determined necessary by the Disabled Students' Program.
3. A statement acknowledging the terms of the ASUC Psychiatric and Psychological Disability Scholarship, and acknowledging the recipients' moral obligation to contribute to the program after graduation.

#### **4.2 Timeline**

1. The Disabled Student's Program shall make applications for ASUC Psychiatric and Psychological Disability Scholarship available at the beginning of each Academic Year.
2. Final Decisions of ASUC Psychiatric and Psychological Disability Scholarship recipients may be made at any time during and prior to the end of the fall semester of that Academic Year.

### **ARTICLE V - EVALUATION COMMITTEE**

#### **5.1 Composition**

1. The Evaluation Committee shall consist of two staff members employed by the Disabled Students' Program and the Psychiatric Disability Specialist of the Disabled Students' Program. Only registered employees of the Disabled Students' Program can participate in the evaluation committee in order to maintain a high level of confidentiality.
2. All members shall be voting members.

#### **5.2 Purpose**

1. The Evaluation Committee shall select the new recipients of the ASUC Psychiatric and Psychological Disability Scholarship in accordance with the criteria stated in Article 2.1.

### **ARTICLE VI - FUNDING**

#### **6.1 ASUC Funding**

1. The ASUC Senate shall allocate funds from the ASUC Carry Forward Account to the ASUC Psychiatric and Psychological Disability Scholarship. Each year, the ASUC Psychiatric and Psychological Disability Scholarship Program account shall hold no less than \$1500.00.
2. The ASUC Senate shall have final discretion regarding the source of funding for the ASUC Psychiatric and Psychological Disability Scholarship. The purpose of this subsection is to ensure adequate funding for the ASUC Psychiatric and Psychological Disability Scholarship Program.
3. All funds will be submitted to UC Berkeley's Disabled Students' Program with the intent to fund the scholarship.

## **6.2 Private Funding**

The Disabled Students' Union and the Disabled Students' Program shall seek out private sources of funding from alumni, students, and University benefactors to augment the ASUC funding. All extra contributions may be used to establish an endowment for the scholarship or to provide a scholarship for another male or female eligible applicant.

## **6.3 Endowment**

The ASUC shall seek, through ASUC and private funding, to establish an endowment from which ASUC Psychiatric and Psychological Disability Scholarships shall be awarded. The ASUC shall seek to work in conjunction with the Disabled Students' Union and the Disabled Students' Program to maximize the endowment.

## **6.4 Funding Roll Over**

Funds allocated to the ASUC Psychiatric and Psychological Disability Scholarship Program by the ASUC, or donated through private funding, that have not been spent by the end of the fiscal year shall be exempt from Title III, Article 6.2 of the ASUC By-Laws (Funding Roll Over). Funds that have not been spent during a single academic year shall roll over into the following academic year's ASUC Psychiatric and Psychological Disability Scholarship, and may be added to the established Annuity.

## **6.5 Termination of Program**

If the Disabled Students' Union or Disabled Students' Program finds an outstanding private contributor, or if the University of California decides to institute a program of aid replacement, the ASUC Senate shall consider the necessity of its annual contributions.

### **Title XXII Ecology Restoration Group Director**

#### **ARTICLE I: GOAL**

**1.1 The Ecology Restoration Group is a non-profit student group restoring the Strawberry Canyon Area. This internship will pay the Director of the Ecology Restoration Group a semester stipend of \$1000 post completion of the semester of successful work.**

#### **ARTICLE II: APPOINTMENT**

**2.2 The ASUC President shall be responsible for appointing the Ecology Restoration Group Director at any point in the semester. The Ecology Restoration Group Director shall then be confirmed by two-thirds of the ASUC Senate. The Ecology Restoration Group Director shall be appointed every semester. The Ecology Restoration Group Director shall:**

1. Form a committee in charge of raising funds, organizing events, and keeping contact with the Cal student groups, staff, working groups, chancellors, and regents.
2. Appoint and manage all of the executive body of the Ecology Restoration Group: Trail Design and Restoration Manager; Grant writing and event planning manager; and law, policy, and PR manager.
3. Hold weekly team meetings for executive body and student group meetings for members.
4. Manage budget (estimated at \$40,000 by end of project), continually seek internal and external funding, supervise grant calendar, supervise grant writing manager.
5. Supervise and facilitate on-campus research related to restoration efforts, manage and supervise all executive bodies units, increase faculty advising and increase faculty involvement.
6. Compose annual/bi-annual reports and manage position replacement for all managers and this internship.

**WHEREAS**, the ASUC fiscal year 08-09 budget allocates \$48,000 for elections costs, \$48,000 in attorney's fees, \$15,572.14 for the Legal Defense Fund and the GA fiscal year 08-09 budget allocates approximately \$50,000 for its business office and stenographer; and

**WHEREAS**, the 'expense share percentage' shall be defined as the percentage of all commercial activities residual revenue which is directed to the GA from the previous fiscal year;

**THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED**, the GA and the ASUC agree to share fairly and equitably the expenses of ASUC elections, the GA business office and stenographer, the ASUC attorney and contributions to the ASUC Legal Defense Fund subject to the following terms:

1. For the ASUC elections, the GA shall pay the greater of the expense share percentage of the election cost and the amount specified in section V of the *Memorandum of Understanding between the Associated Students of the University of California and the Graduate Assembly*;
2. The ASUC and the GA formally request that the ASUC Auxiliary pay the full expense of the GA business office and stenographer;
3. The GA shall pay the expense share percentage of ASUC attorney's fees;
4. The GA shall pay the portion equal to the expense share percentage of the total amount to be deposited into the Legal Defense Fund that year;

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, this expense sharing agreement shall be in effect in years when following three conditions are fulfilled:

1. The GA Delegates and the ASUC Senate ratify identical expense sharing resolutions;

2. The Chancellor executes proposed amendments to the Commercial Activities Agreement which bring about fair commercial activities revenue sharing between the GA and the ASUC;
3. The total residual commercial activities revenue returned to student government is at least \$274,000;

**BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED**, that the GA adopts this expense sharing resolution as a standing policy.

**A Bill in Support of Shared Commercial Activities Revenue between the ASUC and the Graduate Assembly (GA)**

---

**WHEREAS**, when graduate and undergraduate students work collaboratively on a project in the pursuit of a mutual goal, the success of that project is all the more likely;

**WHEREAS**, graduate students comprise approximately one-third of the student population on the Berkeley campus;

**WHEREAS**, ASUC commercial activities revenue has been relatively flat for the past ten years, which is inconsistent with inflation, since if the revenue had kept up with inflation, the total revenue would have been \$1,000,000 more than it is today;

**WHEREAS**, the residual commercial activities revenue returned to the ASUC student government was \$0 for fiscal year 2007-2008 and is projected to be \$0 for fiscal year 2008-2009;

**WHEREAS**, it is fiscally beneficial to develop ASUC businesses that are attractive to graduate students;

**WHEREAS**, it is fiscally sensible to encourage greater patronage of existing and future ASUC commercial business in general;

**WHEREAS**, it is important and necessary to create incentives for graduate students to invest time and money in order to ensure the present and future profitability of student government commercial activities;

**WHEREAS**, an agreement to share commercial activities revenue would make it worthwhile for the GA proceed with its plans to make available the Anthony Hall patio as rental space and to pursue the idea situating a coffee vendor cart in front of Anthony Hall;

**WHEREAS**, an agreement to share commercial activities revenue would make it worthwhile for the GA to promote graduate student patronage of the Lower Sproul businesses.

**WHEREAS**, graduate students are at Berkeley for longer periods of time, and consequently have a more expansive institutional memory, which is crucial for successfully managed business;

**WHEREAS**, it would bring about fiscal equity and financial responsibility for commercial activities revenue to be shared as equally and as fairly as student fees currently are;

**WHEREAS**, in their document titled *Graduate Provisions Regarding Lower Sproul Redevelopment*, graduate students indicated that GA investment in a Lower Sproul campaign should be consistent with returns graduate students could see on that investment;

**WHEREAS**, a plan to share only those revenues generated by graduate student patronage would be inconsistent with the goal of maximally increasing revenue because it would only yield revenue generated by a subset of students;

**WHEREAS**, a plan to share only those revenues generated by graduate student patronage would be intractable to implement;

**WHEREAS**, a revenue sharing agreement aimed at increasing overall ASUC commercial activities revenue would be an appropriate action to attempt to jumpstart revenue growth after ten years of essentially constant revenue;

**WHEREAS**, revenue received by the GA from student government commercial activities would enable it to better serve its constituency by increasing its capacity to fund student groups and advocacy, and to adequately support a wide range of programming aimed at improving student life and services;

**WHEREAS**, the proposed sharing agreement seeks to enlarge revenue rather than divide up an already small residual, given the \$274,000 minimum sharing threshold;

**WHEREAS**, the \$274,000 minimum sharing threshold corresponds to slightly more than the maximum residual revenue ever returned to student government (in Fiscal Year 1999 - 2000);

**WHEREAS**, a residual revenue return in excess of the \$274,000 minimum sharing threshold would benchmark the accomplishment of the GA and the ASUC collaboratively working toward a more successful commercial activities enterprise;

**WHEREAS**, the proposed amendments to the Commercial Activities Agreement are consistent with the intent to share revenue and to encourage greater graduate student involvement in commercial activities for the purpose of establishing financial equity and optimizing fiscal returns; and

**WHEREAS**, the proposed sharing agreement is responsible since it is accompanied by a proposal to share expenses;

**THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED**, that the ASUC and the Graduate Assembly agree to recommend amendments to the Commercial Activities Agreement as follows (altered/added text appears in all caps):

*1.2.3 The PRESIDENT OF THE ASUC, THE EXECUTIVE VICE PRESIDENT AND THE PRESIDENT OF THE GRADUATE ASSEMBLY, OR THEIR DESIGNATES shall be ex officio voting members of the Board.*

*4.1 ASUC and GA Accounts.*

*A. STUDENT GOVERNMENT FEES AND REVENUE. TWO SEPARATE BANK ACCOUNTS SHALL BE ESTABLISHED, ONE DESIGNATED AS THE ASUC STUDENT FEE ACCOUNT AND ONE DESIGNATED AS THE GRADUATE ASSEMBLY STUDENT FEE ACCOUNT. STUDENT*

*REGISTRATION FEES AND OTHER NON-COMMERCIAL FUNDS GENERATED BY THE RESPECTIVE BRANCHES OF STUDENT GOVERNMENT SHALL BE DEPOSITED AS APPROPRIATE INTO EACH OF THE AFORESAID ACCOUNTS. STUDENT FEES SHALL BE DEPOSITED INTO EACH ACCOUNT IN ACCORDANCE WITH SECTION 4.1.1, BELOW.*

*B. COMMERCIAL REVENUE. TWO SEPARATE BANK ACCOUNTS SHALL BE ESTABLISHED, ONE DESIGNATED AS THE ASUC COMMERCIAL REVENUES ACCOUNT AND ONE DESIGNATED AS THE GRADUATE ASSEMBLY COMMERCIAL REVENUES ACCOUNT. REVENUE FROM STUDENT GOVERNMENT COMMERCIAL ACTIVITIES SHALL BE DEPOSITED INTO EACH ACCOUNT IN ACCORDANCE WITH SECTION 5.3, 5.3.1 AND 5.3.2.*

*4.1.1. FAIR SHARE PERCENTAGE. THE ASUC FAIR SHARE PERCENTAGE IS THE NUMBER OF ENROLLED UNDERGRADUATE STUDENTS AS A PERCENTAGE OF ALL ENROLLED STUDENTS FOR THE PREVIOUS ACADEMIC YEAR (SEPTEMBER THROUGH MAY). THE GRADUATE ASSEMBLY FAIR SHARE PERCENTAGE IS ONE HUNDRED PERCENT (100%) LESS THE ASUC FAIR SHARE PERCENTAGE.*

*4.2 Accounting. The Auxiliary shall provide accounting services for the ASUC and ASUC Commercial Activities. Both the Student Fee Account(s) and the Commercial Revenue Account(s) shall be established and maintained with two groups of signatories. The signatories of Group "A" shall be the President and Executive Vice President of the ASUC. The signatories of Group "B" shall be the Director of the Auxiliary and his/her designee(s). Checks drawn in the amount of \$ 1,000 or more shall require two signatures, at least one of which shall be from Group "A". A stop payment order with respect to checks of \$ 1,000 or more shall require two signatures, at least one of which shall be from Group "A". The bank(s) at which these accounts are maintained shall issue duplicate monthly statements to both the ASUC and the Auxiliary. FOR PURPOSES OF THE GRADUATE ASSEMBLY STUDENT FEE ACCOUNT AND THE GRADUATE ASSEMBLY COMMERCIAL REVENUES ACCOUNT, THE GRADUATE ASSEMBLY PRESIDENT SHALL BE A SIGNATORY OF GROUP "A".*

*4.3.1 Any official of the ASUC, ANY DELEGATE, CHAIR, OR OFFICER OF GA and any member of the Board may at all reasonable times during regular business hours inspect the books and records of the Auxiliary and make copies and extracts therefrom and may discuss the affairs, accounts and finances of the Auxiliary with its managers and employees, and the University will furnish to the ASUC, GRADUATE ASSEMBLY, and the Board statements which are accurate in all material respects regarding the operations of the Auxiliary, its rental income, its Operating Expenses, and, to the extent known to the University, the operations of*

*third party providers of ASUC Campus Commercial Activities, all at such times and as often as shall be reasonably requested.*

*5.1 ..... In order to control Operating Expenses, the Auxiliary's budget for any fiscal year shall not, without the express, prior written consent of the Chancellor, THE ASUC SENATE AND THE GRADUATE ASSEMBLY, exceed the budget for the preceding fiscal year plus an amount equal to the product of the budget for the preceding fiscal year multiplied by the sum of five percent plus the percentage increase in the Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers (I 982-84=1 00) of the Bureau of Labor Statistics (or any comparable successor thereto) for such fiscal year.*

*5.3 ASUC Commercial Activities Income After Repayment of ASUC Debt. After the ASUC Debt is fully repaid, all income received by the University or the ASUC from third parties conducting ASUC Commercial Activities shall be paid as follows:*

*5.3.1 such third parties shall make periodic payments to the University sufficient in the aggregate to cover the estimated Operating Expenses for the then current fiscal year of the Auxiliary; and*

*5.3.2 SUCH THIRD PARTIES SHALL PAY THE BALANCE OF THEIR CONTRACTUAL PAYMENT OBLIGATIONS ("STUDENT GOVERNMENT PAYMENTS") DIRECTLY TO THE STUDENT GOVERNMENTS. IF THE TOTAL ANNUAL STUDENT GOVERNMENT PAYMENTS ARE \$274,000 OR LESS, THEN THEY SHALL BE DESPOSITED INTO THE ASUC COMMERCIAL REVENUES ACCOUNT. IF THE TOTAL ANNUAL STUDENT GOVERNMENT PAYMENTS ARE GREATER THAN \$274,000, THEN THE GREATER OF (1) \$274,000 OR (2) THE ASUC FAIR SHARE PERCENTAGE OF THE TOTAL ANNUAL STUDENT GOVERNMENT PAYMENTS SHALL BE DEPOSITED INTO THE ASUC COMMERCIAL REVENUES ACCOUNT, WITH THE REMAINDER BEING DEPOSITED INTO THE GRADUATE ASSEMBLY COMMERCIAL REVENUES ACCOUNT. The Director of the Auxiliary may propose for the Board's approval that one or more of the third party providers of ASUC Commercial Activities divide payments between the ASUC and the University so as to effect the intent of this Section 5.3, based on the Auxiliary's budget.*

*11.2 Appeal to the Chancellor. If resolution of a dispute cannot be achieved through the measures described in Section 11.1, above, the President of the ASUC AND THE PRESIDENT OF THE GRADUATE ASSEMBLY may appeal directly to the Chancellor whose decision shall be final. Any such appeal shall be in writing, setting forth the basis for the appeal. The Chancellor may, but shall not be obligated to, meet and confer with the President of the ASUC regarding such appeal. Any decision of the Chancellor hereunder shall be in writing, shall be delivered to the President of the ASUC and to the Board, and shall be accompanied by a written statement of the basis for such decision.*

*15 All notices, requests, demands and other communications given or required to be given under this Agreement shall be in writing, delivered personally, by registered or certified mail, return receipt requested, or via overnight commercial courier services as follows:*

*Any such notice sent by registered or certified mail, return receipt requested, shall be deemed to have been duly given and received two (2) business days after it is mailed with postage prepaid. Notice sent in any other manner shall be effective upon actual receipt thereof.*

**BE IT FUTHER RESOLVED**, that approval of this bill shall neither imply nor engender changes to current revenue or expense allocation agreements or practices except where specifically defined in this or future agreements;

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that if approved, this bill will be forwarded to the Stores Operation Board for approval and, with the approval of the board, shall be forwarded to the UC Berkeley Chancellor for final approval and contract amendment execution;

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that a committee whose name shall be called the Revenue Sharing Committee be created under Title III of the ASUC Financial Bylaws consisting of the ASUC President, the GA President, one Senator, and one graduate student member of the Stores Operation Board;

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that the Revenue Sharing Committee shall be charged with producing a Report on Commercial Activity Revenue Sharing due on February 29<sup>th</sup> (every four years) to both the ASUC Senate and the GA Delegate Assembly, which analyzes relevant changes in circumstances since the last report and which makes recommendations regarding how to continue progress toward the goals of this resolution;

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that in years when the Report on Commercial Activity Revenue Sharing is not due, the committee is charged with monitoring progress toward the goals of this resolution and, if the committee decides it is necessary, may issue an interim Report on Commercial Activity Revenue Sharing due on or before February 28<sup>th</sup> of the current academic year;

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that the prevue of the Revenue Sharing Committee and subject of the Report on Commercial Activity Revenue Sharing may encompass consideration of any sharing of ASUC and GA expenses insofar as such sharing is related to the goals of this resolution and the financial circumstances of the time; and

**BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED**, that the ASUC Senate delegates all necessary authority to the ASUC President to make any necessary change to agreement in order to secure approval by the Chancellor and the Stores Operation Board.
